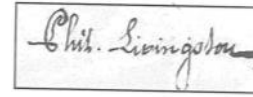
"To see the infinite pity of this place,

Signer #17: Phillip Livingston (1716-1778)

New York. Age at signing: 60

Quotes & Notes:

When Phillip Livingston signed the Declaration, he believed he was putting his vast fortune in jeopardy, and indeed it was so. All his business interests fell to the enemy. His mansion on Duke Street was seized by the British and turned into a barracks for enemy troops. His country estate on Brooklyn Heights was turned into a British naval hospital. Homeless, his family fled up the Hudson River to Kingston, NY. They were again endangered when the British burned Kingston. Phillip Livingston was never able to return home, and his health was devastated because of the strain from the war. Remaining faithful to the cause, he and his family sold some of their remaining property to help maintain the country's credit.

For Phillip Livingston, the revolution meant personal ruin and yet his spirits remained strong.

His last moments were correspondent with his tenor of his well-spent life. He met, with characteristic firmness and Christian fortitude, the trying hour which separated him from this world.

May we give honor to him, by remembering what was said of him by those who knew and loved him. "He was a firm believer in the great truths of the Christian system, and a sincere and humble follower of the divine Redeemer."
